Title: History of Kites

### Summary:

While the Chinese used kites to ward off evil spirits, the Tibetans used kites to bring rain. Now, kites are used to measure air pressure, temperature, humidity, speed and direction of the wind. This use was discovered by Benjamin Franklin in 1752, who wanted to prove that lightning was caused by electricity. Taking readings has become easier with the invention of thermography.
